

Adult Divisions (Ages 18+): \$5 Per Entry

ENTRY FEES ARE NON-REFUNDABLE

Late Entry: \$10 Per Entry

GUIDELINES

- **Each exhibitor may submit up to six (6) items per Division for judging.** *Example: An exhibitor may enter up to 6 items in Crochet and up to 6 items in Basket Weaving.*
- **Entries may not exceed 48" in any direction and must weigh less than 40 lbs. This does not include Afghans, Shawls or weavings.**
- Each adult exhibitor will receive one (1) daily admission ticket to the Fair.
- Items previously exhibited at the Florida State Fair are not eligible for competition.
- **All entries must have been completed within the past two (2) years.**
- Entries must be entirely prepared, created, or processed by the exhibitor listed on the entry form.
- Collaborative works created by two or more individuals are allowed but will be counted as one exhibitor entry (under the name of the individual who registered online).
- All entries will be displayed at the Fair, regardless of whether they receive an award. In keeping with the Florida State Fair's family-friendly environment, entries containing offensive, controversial, or otherwise inappropriate subject matter will not be accepted.

JUDGING & AWARDS

- The Fair selects judges who are experienced and knowledgeable in the categories they are assigned. Judges are expected to be fair and unbiased. They may reassign an entry to a different division or class if they feel it's a better fit.
- All entries will be judged using a scorecard to help ensure fairness and consistency. Judges' decisions are final.
- If the judge feels that an entry does not meet the standards for an award, no ribbon or prize will be given, even if it is the only entry in the class.
- Winners and final displays will be announced during the Fair.

JUDGING CRITERIA

Divisions and Classes in this handbook will be judged by a combination of the following criteria:

General Appearance, Construction, Workmanship, Design in Relationship to Yarn/Thread, Degree of Difficulty or Presentation.

MATERIALS

Acceptable Fibers: Cotton, Silk, Rayon, Wool, Bamboo, Metallics and blended fibers.

HANDSPUN YARN DEFINITIONS

Handspun Yarn and garment must be the sole work of the exhibitor. All items constructed using handspun yarn must include a minimum of 6" sample of fiber or roving.

Non-animal fiber includes silk, flax/linen, hemp, etc.

Art Yarn defies everything we thought we knew about yarn. Art yarn wouldn't be suitable for normal patterns, even after making adjustments. It can be made from no more than 50% of non-handspun materials.

Synthetic Handspun Yarns are spun from man-made or manufactured fibers.

Any item made from Llama & Alpaca Fibers. Items must be made of at least 60% Llama (Llama, Alpaca, Paco-Vicuna, or Guanaco) and up to 40% of other natural fiber.

NOTE: Handspun Yarn should be wound neatly and tied in four places. They should be the weight indicated.

NOTE: Items Made from Handspun Yarn should be made from yarn that was handspun by the maker.

*** Any item made from Llama & Alpaca Fibers. Items must be made of at least 60% Llama (Llama, Alpaca, PacoVicuna, or Guanaco) and up to 40% of other natural fiber.**

BASKET WEAVING DEFINITIONS

Flat reed (includes Flat and Flat Oval): These baskets are predominately made from commercially processed reed from the Rattan vine. Oak handles and wood bases can be used, but the majority of the basket is flat or flat oval reed.

Hardwood Splint: Baskets made from white oak, black ash, hickory, maple, cedar, and chestnut. The weaving materials are the raw wood that has been manually processed to obtain or make the weavers, staves, and handles.

Florida Naturals: Baskets made from barks, vines (grape, kudzu, honeysuckle, etc.), roots, grasses, inflorescence, philodendron, pine needles, roots, seed pods, etc. - anything grown and gathered in Florida. Must have at least 80% Florida natural fibers.

Wicker: Baskets made from round reed or natural willow.

Coiling: Baskets formed in a continuous spiral made of pine needles, grasses, and cords.

Ribbed: Baskets are all woven (flat reed, round reed, naturals) around one round rim or two hoops and ribs made of reed spokes.

Mold Woven: Nantucket and Shaker baskets that are woven over a mold to create a uniform shape and size. Many have wood bottoms and staves are usually flat or flat oval reed, cane, ash, or cedar.

Miniature: Any style of basket that is 4" or less

Mixed Media: Any combination of reed, splint, wire, waxed linen, gourds, leather, fabric, paper, vines, beads, etc. – it is an "anything goes" category. If a gourd is part of your basket, at least 50% of the basket needs to be woven.

Wire or Textile: Any basket made from woven wire, waxed linen, waxed cotton, fabric, paper, rope, sisal, raffia, seagrass, leather, etc.

Kits and Patterns: baskets are constructed from any materials in a purchased project kit or woven from any materials based on another person's pattern or design. They would not be considered "original" work as the weaver is following instructions and using supplies provided or selected by the basket pattern's designer. This includes projects completed in a workshop environment.

Art Basket: any type of an original vessel that may be sculptural and not necessarily functional.

ART CLOTH & TEXTILE SURFACE DESIGN DEFINITIONS

Surface Design encompasses the coloring, patterning, and structuring of fiber and fabric. This involves creative exploration of processes such as dyeing, painting, printing, stitching, embellishing, quilting, weaving, knitting, felting, and papermaking.

Commercial Dyes consist of Fiber Reactive Dyes, Acid Dyes and Disperse Dyes

Natural Dyes consists of Cellulose and Protein Fibers only.

Thickened dye is simply a dye solution which has been thickened into a paste with the help of something like sodium alginate. Thickened dye is absorbed into the fibers, and when the excess dye and print paste is washed away, the fabric is just as soft as before.

Discharge is the removal of dye from fabric.

Resists block the application of dye, paint, or discharge chemicals.

Shibori is a Japanese manual resist dyeing technique, which produces patterns on fabric.

Mixed Methods: We realize that Surface Design may combine a variety of techniques but when choosing a division and class, choose one that best describes the majority of the technique used to create your piece. **If you cannot choose a division and class that works for your work please choose Mixed Methods.**

Cellulose Fibers: Cotton, Linen, Rayon, Bamboo

Protein Fibers: Silk, Wool

Synthetic Fibers: Polyester, Nylon, Acrylic, Acetate

GENERAL RULES

DISCLAIMER

All entries are submitted at the exhibitor's own risk. The Florida State Fair is not responsible for any loss, damage, or theft of exhibits even if caused by staff, volunteers, contractors, or visitors. If you want insurance for your entry, you must arrange it through your personal insurance provider before the Fair. Reasonable care will be taken to protect exhibits. No unauthorized people are allowed in the building after closing hours.

DIVISION OR CLASS CANCELLATION

The Florida State Fair may cancel any division or class if there are not enough entries to ensure fair competition. Any affected entries will be returned.

ENTRY ERRORS

Exhibitors are responsible for making sure their entries are correct. This includes online forms and summary sheets. The Fair is not responsible for correcting mistakes, and no awards will be given for entries disqualified due to exhibitor error. If an award is later found to be ineligible, it will be withheld or recovered. You may appeal a disqualification in writing within 90 days of being notified. Include your name, address, full entry details, and your reason for requesting a review.

PREMIUM PAYMENTS

Prizes will be awarded based on the Judging Criteria Record Sheets. **Prize checks are void 6 months after the date on the check. No replacement checks will be issued after that, so please cash them promptly.**

SUBSTITUTIONS

If needed, substitutions must be made within the same department as the original entry. They must be completed by the last day of the entry delivery period. You may not transfer your entry to another person.

PREVIOUSLY ENTERED ITEMS

Entries that have been shown at past Florida State Fairs are not allowed, except for entries in Horticulture and Aquarium Beautiful.

VERIFICATION OF ENTRY

To confirm that your mailed entry form and fees were received, include a self-addressed stamped envelope with your submission. Online entries will receive a confirmation code after submitting.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR EXHIBITS

The Fair is not responsible for exhibits left behind after the scheduled pick-up time. **Anything left after that time will be treated as abandoned and discarded by April 1st of the same year.**

ENTRY REMOVAL

Once accepted, entries cannot be removed until the official release date listed in the Competition Handbook. Early removal is only allowed in cases like serious illness, emergencies, or at the Fair's discretion.

RETURNED OR BOUNCED CHECKS

A \$25 fee applies to any returned checks. This must be paid with cash, a certified check, or a money order.

MAILING PAPER ENTRY FORMS

Entry Forms must be postmarked by Friday, December 5, 2025. Failure to complete any portion of the entry form may result in disqualification. Late entries must be postmarked before December 12, 2025. If you're submitting a late entry form, you must include the extra \$5 per entry fee. **Make checks payable to: Florida State Fair Authority**

EXHIBIT DESIGN & SET UP

The Florida State Fair controls how exhibits are displayed. If your entry is meant to be hung but isn't ready to hang, the Fair will display it as they see fit. No changes can be made once items are on display. Exhibitors cannot handle their entries after drop-off. Fair staff will handle final placement and assembly, using any instructions you provide. If your item needs assembly or disassembly, include clear instructions and diagrams. The Fair may use pins or other tools to secure your exhibit for display. Online entries will receive a confirmation code after submitting.
